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
Big Questions on the Big Screen!

Nomophobia, the fear of being without a mobile phone, has silently crept into the daily lives of people across all age groups. Among children and teenagers, the impact is even more concerning, as they tend to mirror adult behavior and often face peer pressure to own smartphones at an early age.

Ee Valayam, a Malayalam film that explores the dangers of digital overuse and mobile addiction, was screened for students of Grades 6 - 10. 
